After recognizing the alarming trend of firefighting related cancer diagnoses in 2018, the Myrtle Beach Fire Department implemented sweeping initiatives to reduce carcinogen exposure for their members. From post-fire incident decontamination procedures, to purchasing cancer particulate blocking turnout gear and exhaust capture systems, the Myrtle Beach Fire Department is focused on eliminating the risks to its firefighters.

Topics discussed during this free interactive virtual workshop will include cancer research and statistics, decontamination practices, turnout gear technology, post-incident hazardous monitoring, and other associated wellness initiatives implemented by the Myrtle Beach Fire Department. Additionally, South Carolina State Firefighters' Association representatives will present information regarding the recent <u>South Carolina Cancer Health Benefit Plan (2020</u> <u>Act 168)</u> and the <u>South Carolina Firefighter Cancer Coalition</u>.
