

## Secret Service Training Workshop

A two-part, in-person Secret Service Training Workshop is being offered by the South Carolina Fire Academy in collaboration with two branches of the United States Secret Service, the Critical Protective Analysis Group (CPAG), and the National Threat Assessment Center (NTAC).

Attendance is open to all active fire, police, EMS, and dispatch personnel. Current emergency management professionals, hospital, and school district employees are also welcome to attend.

The CPAG will present information related to pre-operation surveillance, improvised explosive devices, penetrating perimeter security, domestic terrorism, homegrown violent extremists, active shooters, sovereign citizens, motorcade attacks, and coordinated attacks.

The NTAC will present on the findings from its most recent research study. This presentation will focus on how communities can use a multidisciplinary approach to identify, assess, and intervene with individuals exhibiting concerning or threatening behaviors.
